Sister Irene Morrow – 1922-2019 A Tribute

Devotion comes in many forms. Sister Irene devoted over 71 years to the Sisters of St. Joseph. During that time, her devotion to musical education, both of teachers and students, was equally strong.

I began studying pedagogy with Sister Irene in the 1990's and was privileged to hear about her educational studies, her personal family; and as she wasn't one to pursue attention, her general life adventure stories seemed to simply follow her.

In the Beginning

From modest beginnings in Hurkett and Dorion, taking the train for music lessons in Thunder Bay, her music adventure began.

As a teaching nun, she was assigned a many jobs. She earned her Associate in Piano Music Pedagogy from the University of Western Ontario in 1957. Once in Sault Ste Marie, teaching piano frustrated her, as the progress of students seemed very limited. She would say that playing five pieces all year to prepare for a year end exam was ridiculous. It was decided that instead of abandoning teaching, she would go study at Princeton. This was the turning point in her musical future.

As a student of the extremely well respected Frances Clark in New Jersey in 1966, Irene learned what good teaching was and how to dissect music into every element possible. Another renowned pedagogue, Richard Chronister, also shaped her thinking.

Her Books

Never to shy away from hard work, Sister Irene felt she could adapt the knowledge she took from her year at Princeton and she wrote a piano method book. This project lasted for over thirty years! Always one to collaborate, she was sure to include all the advice and contributions from the many friends, students and teachers by her side over these years. Her goal: to make a resource for teachers that enabled piano students to be independent from the very first lesson. She poured over the scope and sequence of how to present the musical elements in her method book with great care.

One of her first thoughts was to compare a Beethoven sonata to the pieces presented in a Grade One book. By doing this, she could prove that it was almost impossible to learn all of these musical elements in the first few years of study unless there was some order and organization to presenting the elements at lessons. This being before the age of

computers, all work was done by old typewriter and by hand. Notation, signs, rhythm; all was examined thoroughly.

She often said, "A student can not go home not knowing what and how to practice." Just as teachers in the classroom have lesson plans, she felt that weekly or better yet, twice weekly lessons, should have a plan. Her books include lesson plans for the teacher. After teaching and being the director at the Marymount School of Music in Sudbury, she "retired" to Thunder Bay. It was during this transition period that her books were published. *New Directions* in a series of A through G books were finally published by Waterloo Music.

The Later Years

While in Thunder Bay she worked feverishly to help the Avila Music School transition, both in location and organization. Her and I climbed the long stairwell to see the president of Lakehead University. She wasn't about to let a music school be swept away. With her help, the music school moved the third floor of the St. Joseph's Manor House, where we would stay for one year until a bigger location could be found. We brought every piano and book with us, up the three flights of stairs, as there was no elevator! We never quite understood how the grand piano made it around the narrow stairwell to the top! Whether it was volunteering at Birthright, Anti-Porn Committee, the Telehealth suicide hotline, Teens Encounter Christ, gathering petitions of mistreated tenants or giving communion at St. Joseph's, Sister Irene was devoted to **doing** something about the issues. Her apartment was always crammed full of teaching materials and files. She got and learned how to use a computer well into her 70s. Teaching well into her eighties, Irene was never short on life stores.

After a long day of teaching, she'd take her big black briefcase in her little white car and drive the 20

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minutes home. As she started along Balmoral Street she quickly realized that blue smoke was pouring out the back of the car. As sunset was quickly approaching, she knew she'd have to go directly to an auto garage. Unfortunately, she had to drive right in front of the police station and an officer pulled her over. He gave her quite a stern speech; about polluting the environment and how could she be so irresponsible. She respected the officer's words; but when retelling the story, she'd comment that she was just a little old lady, how could I cause that? The officer had no clue he was dealing with one of the finest, law abiding citizens ever; let alone a nun. Later it was discovered that during the previous oil change, twice the amount of oil had been put in her car. Billowing blue smoke all down Balmoral Street. What a scene.

To our knowledge, the only original copies of her published piano instruction method books, *New Directions* that remain are housed at the Avila Music School, Thunder Bay. We have over 35 piano instruction method series from a variety of authors. We know resources for teachers were always so important to her. We welcome anyone wishing more information about her books to contact 807-623-9398 should you wish to talk about or borrow the series.

Like the amethyst of northern Ontario, her books are a gem waiting to be rediscovered .

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

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


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
