branches have to report.


Be sure to check out what ORMTA Branches were up to during Canada Music Week – there is lots of inspiration and some great stories (starting on page 20).

HAMILTON-HALTON

2019 Halloween Recital. In recognition of Canada Music Week sixteen students - beginner to advanced levels - performed varied compositions by Canadian Composers. Two students performed their own compositions. Their creativity on the piano showcased how each one, through the compositional process, were well mentored by their Hamilton-Halton Branch Member teacher.

Since the Christmas season was a very busy time for teachers. students, and their families, in lieu of planning and holding a live recital in a venue, members were encouraged, with parental consent, to video tape their student(s) performing music that reflected the season. Branch President, Sharona Clarke and Vice President. Amelia Yates collaborated on setting up a branch YouTube channel to make this platform available to upload videos. At the first General Meeting in the New Year held on January 27, 2020 two videos (featuring a piano solo, and a flute duet) were viewed. As explained, playlists can be created to highlight different categories of students' video performances when submitted throughout the year.

The next scheduled student recital is the First Class Honors in March. Students whose names appear on the the 2019 FCH list for having successfully earning 80+ percent in vocal, instrumental and theory exams are eligible to perform. For students who achieved the highest marks in their practical / theory grade level, they will be presented with a Scholarship or Branch Award.

To provide branch members with ongoing professional development, Amelia suggested



the idea of presenting a Teachers' Idea Exchange. Amelia asked for volunteers to submit a brief abstract of their topic that they are passionate about. Upon review Amelia will select three teachers to present via the Zoom internet platform. On this forum, branch members can learn from one another as ideas are shared. 

INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

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



SPOTLIGHT ON FORMER ORMTA YOUNG ARTISTS:

2014 WINNER: CHARISSA VANDIKAS

This third article is about ORMTA's former 2014 Young Artist and 2015 CFMTA National Piano Competition winner, Charissa Vandikas. Recently, I received an email addressed to Charissa from an adult student who is restarting her piano lessons. She had stumbled upon Charissa's recordings of Susan Griesdale's set of piano pieces, Arctic Voices. She had this to say: When I found your version, I was swept away. You painted pictures in music. I wanted to play the piece like that. Not that I want to copy you exactly, but I want to be able to play with the same certainty, the same control, and the same beauty as you played with. The bar went way, way up. You have made one little old lady inspired and so grateful. Thank you.

This message truly reflects on how rewarding the musical journey can be for ORMTA's former Young Artists. Here are Charissa's own reflections on how the Young Artist Tour led her to a quest for a deeper understanding of her music:

Looking back on my relationship with the Ontario Music Teachers' Association, I can't help but smile at what a wild and wonderful ride it's been. When my teacher at the time, Dr. Michael Esch, became a member, I had no idea of the vastness of ORMTA, nor the communities and people it would connect me to.



I won the ORMTA Young Artist competition in 2014, which led me to my first ever tour experience around Ontario. It was an eye-opening couple of months, and even though I brought the same program to seven different towns and cities, each concert couldn't be more different from the last. For one, I played in so many beautiful spaces, from Ottawa's gorgeous and imposing Tabaret Hall to the lovely intimate music room of the KWCMS. And though the audiences naturally varied, one thing that did not was the excited buzz of anticipation before a concert, as well as the warmth with which I was received. In many ways these concerts were like community gatherings, and I felt blessed to be a part of it, if only for an afternoon.

A year later, I learned that ORMTA was part of a nation-wide association called the CFMTA. They hold a biennial competition for the Young Artist winners of every province, which I was thrilled to qualify for in 2015. This took me to Vancouver in the summer, where I met pianists from all over Canada. There, I made one good friend in particular—Linda Ruan, the Young Artist from BC. After being blown away by her playing (she would go on to win a well-deserved top prize in the competition), I approached her to talk. By coincidence, we learned we'd both be beginning undergraduate degrees at Toronto's Glenn Gould School of Music that September.

At the end of the week, I was honoured to receive first prize in the 2015 CFMTA National Competition. The whole time I was in Vancouver, I remember being sent heartwarming messages from the people of ORMTA who were cheering me on. The tour played a huge part in the development of the musical interpretations that I eventually brought to Vancouver—as well as the development of my confidence, both as a musician and as a young adult.

Five years later, I'm in the midst of pursuing a master's degree in piano performance at the Université de Montréal, and still feeling the effects of my involvement with ORMTA. Linda and I became great friends during our time in Toronto and are now on our fifth year of playing together as La Fiammata piano duo. Together, we've won prizes in national and international competitions (most recently Romania's Suzana Szörenyi International Duo Competition) and have been featured on CBC's radio broadcast, In Concert.

Thanks to ORMTA and CFMTA, I've come so far as a musician, and even made a lifelong friend from the other side of the country along the way. Thank you all for the warmth, support, and opportunity. It really has been the most incredible journey.

Afterwards, we all enjoyed a beautiful reception."

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





The invoices will be generated on the new ORMTA website (www.ormta.org) in late April 2020. Traditional paper invoices will be mailed for those who do not have an email address or access to a computer.

There are three available methods of payment: email transfer, PayPal (debit or credit card) by logging into the ORMTA website or cheque/money order, made out to ORMTA and sent to me by mail.

Please note that all branch levies (if applicable) are a mandatory annual fee.

-from ORMTA bylaws Part IX 9.19-9.21 (Passed by the general membership in the July 2016 Matters for Voting)

On January 20, 2020, the Ontario Consumer Price Index (CPI%) for the year 2019 was officially confirmed at 2.1%. This percentage has been applied to the 2020-21 Provincial and Branch fees. (The 2018 CPI was 2.3%.)

The 2020-21 CFMTA fees have been increased from \$35.00 per member to \$37.00 per member. This fee is optional for RETIRED members. The fee is also optional for SEMI-RETIRED members but it is necessary to belong to CFMTA if the member intends to accept the Insurance option.

The 2020-2021 Westland Insurance Company rates have been increased from \$35.00 per member to \$40.00 per member.

It has been confirmed by ORMTA's accountant at Bridgman & Durksen Insurance that music teachers are not required to charge HST for music lessons regardless of their annual salary range. Music lessons are exempt services.
